Barriers/Challenges

- Mentions having trouble or difficulty
- Mentions having an issue
- Mentions requiring more time
- Mentions an activity being stopped or discontinued
- Mentions somebody not understanding
- Mentions financial difficulty
 - Subthemes:
 - Intrinsic: related to an individuals' inherent skills or characteristics
 - Extrinsic: related to outside environmental factors

Supports

- Mentions assistance, support, help, or prompting from staff, family, communication partner
- Mentions personal needs or strategies used to help them through the experience
- Mentions or refers to intrinsic or extrinsic supports
- Mentions existing or ideal program or activity rules and structure
- Mentions own physical motor skills and abilities
 - o e.g., "I can physically do most of it on my own"
- Mentions teaching staff, a communication partner, or family a technique or skill to improve the participant's experience
- Mentions support from family, friends, staff, or communication partners
 - o e.g., encouraging words or smiles
- Something a person needs to do to be successful within an activity
- Mentions financial support
- Mentions communication being key or required for support from instructors

Benefits

- Mentions individual benefits, positive outcomes, or positive feelings

 - o e.g., enjoyment, fun, likes
- Mentions something that is important to the individual

- Mentions education and advocacy for the general public about individuals with disabilities
- Subthemes:

 - Mentions physical/wellness benefits, love for the outdoors, fun/enjoyment/happiness, adventure, like/love
 - Extrinsic
 - Mentions social opportunities, meeting others, teaching others, environmental factors

Communication

- Mentions talking or communicating

- Mentions "encouraging" others
